BRIEF DESCRIPTIONS OF EXTERNAL REVIEWERS

Patricia Smith Yaeger Associate Professor, Department of English Language and Literature, University of Michigan. Dr. Yaeger was previously an Associate Professor at Harvard University where she was co-chair of the Committee on Instruction. Among her honors are the LS&A Excellence in Education Award and an Amoco Foundation Faculty Teaching Award. She is the author or editor of five books (one forthcoming) and serves on the editorial boards of several journals. **(arm's length – suggested by the department)**

Leslie Kanés Weisman Professor of Architecture, New Jersey Institute of Technology. Professor Weisman has been one of the pioneers of feminist criticism in architecture. She co-founded the Women's School of Planning and Architecture in 1974. Among her many publications is her book, *Discrimination by design: A feminist critique of the man-made environment*. **(arm's length – suggested by the candidate)**

Kenneth Helphand Professor of Landscape Architecture at the University of Oregon and Fellow of the American Society of Landscape Architecture. Professor Helphand is co-editor of *Landscape Architecture*, the profession's leading peer-reviewed journal. He is one of the most respected scholars in the field of landscape architecture and author of two highly regarded works on vernacular landscape criticism. **(not arm's length – suggested by the department)**

Elsa Barkley Brown Associate Professor of History and Women's Studies and Affiliate in African American Studies and American Studies, University of Maryland. Professor Brown is one of the most compelling historians exploring space, particularly in relation to African-American gender history. Among her many articles is "Mapping the terrain of Black Richmond" in the *Journal of Urban History*. **(arm's length – suggested by the department)**

Darrell Morrison Professor of Landscape Architecture and former Dean of the School of Environmental Design at the University of Georgia. Professor Morrison was a founding editor of *Landscape Journal*, the foremost journal in the field. He is a Fellow of the American Society of Landscape Architects. **(arm's length – suggested by the candidate)**

Nan Ellin Associate Professor of Urban Design and Planning, College of Design, Architecture, Art, and Planning, at the University of Cincinnati. Professor Ellin is one of the most vigorous scholars at the cutting edge of architectural discourse. The author of the highly praised *Post-modern Urbanism* (published by Blackwell Press and reissued by Princeton Architectural Press), has helped to bridge the gap between architectural discourse and contemporary cultural criticism. **(not arm's length – suggested by the candidate)**

Carl Marbury Director of the Alabama Black History Project and Professor of the Humanities, Alabama State University. Professor Marbury is the resident historian of the Tuskegee Institute National Historic Site and was previously Distinguished University Professor at Tuskegee. As the Director of the Alabama Black History Project, he is at the helm of the most comprehensive project documenting African-American history in the state. He is a former president of Alabama Agricultural and Mechanical State University, Alabama's black land-grant school under the Morrill Act. **(arm's length – suggested by the department)**

Edward Pryce Professor Emeritus of Landscape Architecture at Tuskegee University and the first African American to be named a Fellow of the American Society of Landscape Architects. More than a quarter century ago, he headed a team that authored the report that led to the Tuskegee campus designation as a national historic site. **(arm's length – suggested by the candidate)**

BRIEF DESCRIPTIONS OF EXTERNAL REVIEWERS

Reviewer A:

Charles Donahue, Jr. is Paul A. Freund Professor of Law at Harvard University, where he teaches property and legal history. He was previously a member of the University of Michigan Law School faculty. He is coauthor of a leading casebook on the law of real property and has written extensively about property and legal history.

Reviewer B:

Carol M. Rose is Gordon Bradford Tweedy Professor of Law and Organization at Yale Law School, where she teaches property, contracts, environmental law, land use planning, and natural resources law. She was previously on the faculties of Stanford Law School, University of California at Berkeley, Northwestern, and University of Chicago. She is co-author of a casebook on property law and is a leading scholar on property theory.

Reviewer C:

Jeremy Waldron is Maurice and Hilda Friedman Professor of Law at Columbia University where he teaches courses in jurisprudence and legal theory. He was previously a member of faculty of the University of California, Berkeley School of Law. He is the author of a book on the theory of private property.

Reviewer D:

Gregory S. Alexander is Professor of Law at Cornell Law School, where he teaches real property, property theory, and estate and trust law. He recently wrote a book on property theory that received an award for best law book of 1997 from the American Publishers Association.

Reviewer E:

Robert C. Ellickson is Walter E. Meyer Professor of Property and Urban Law at Yale Law School, where he teaches courses in property, land use planning, real estate transactions, and torts. He was previously on the Stanford Law School faculty. He has written extensively about property theory and recently published a book about how property owners resolve disputes outside the legal system that won the Order of the Coif Triennial Book Award. He is also co-author of a casebook on property law.

Reviewer F:

Joseph L. Sax is James S. House & Hiram H. Hurd Professor of Environmental Law at the University of California, Berkeley, where he teaches environmental law, natural resources, and water rights. He was previously a member of the University of Michigan Law School faculty. He has written extensively about environmental law and the control of environmental resources.
